
On Tuesday, October 6, 2015, our membership officer Beverly Truzzolino addressed the members relaying her adventures on a recent trip to Portugal, Spain, France, and Italy. Of course, her trip was very eventful, so she focused on a portion of her and her husband Dan's trip, to their visit to San Giovanni Rotondo, Italy. (Where the incorrupted remains of Saint Padre Pio reside).

Beverly opened with handouts of her 21-day pilgrimage locations and information surrounding becoming a spiritual child of Padre Pio. All of the towns/cities that she and Dan visited, they celebrated Mass. She commented on the beauty of the basilicas that they visited. Their last stop was in Rome. They participated in an audience with Pope Francis, on the very day before he departed to the United States for his celebrated visit. They were close enough to Pope Francis that they could have reached out and touched him, but they politely refrained from that. After that, on to Southern Italy to Monte Cassino. This was the home of St. Benedict and St. Scholastica.....a little trivia, they were brother and sister. Both were accomplished saints that ministered to God's work in their lives. One of the main motivations for Beverly to take this trip was to visit San Giovanni Rotondo, as she has a very special devotion to Padre Pio. Beverly went on to explain a bit more about Padre Pio utilizing the wonderful pictures that she had taken on the pilgrimage. He was born in Petrocino, Italy. He was the 5th of 8 children. At a very young age, he had visions, and was able to have conversations with Jesus. At age 16 he was diagnosed with tuberculosis, which many thought would be fatal, however he was strong in spirit and went on to the seminary. He was ordained in 1910. He was 22 when he was ordained. He was afflicted with the "stigmata" in September of 1918. He had many years of suffering and was prohibited from saving Mass for three years while the Church investigated his wounds for the purpose of authenticating them. He drew large crowds of people venerating him and tending to his wounds. Beverly relayed, in Padre Pio's own words, what the "stigmata" was like and all feelings and thoughts that he experienced surrounding that affliction. His commentary was fascinating.

St. Padre Pio possessed many gifts from God: the gift of healing, Prophecy, bi-location, miracles, etc. He had the ability to read hearts. Although he possessed many of God's gifts, he never felt worthy of them. He never put the gift before the giver. He was consistently humble. Then, we had an audience participation where fellow Serrans read very "quotable quotes" from Padre Pio that were really profound and which gave us a very clear sense of who this Saint was and where his faith resided. Here is one example: "prayer is the oxygen of the soul". And: "Pray, hope and don't worry". He started a hospital that currently has 1,000-plus beds and growing. Translated the name of the hospital is the "house for the relief of suffering". This is only one of his lasting legacies. Great Job, Beverly and thanks for sharing with all of us!

Club News

On October 20, 2015, Kari Walker, M.S., Director of Education of the Orange County Chapter of the Alzheimer's Association visited us and shared an excellent presentation, entitled "Understanding Dementia-Related Changes in Communication and Behavior".

Kari is passionately committed to inspiring older adults to age successfully through the development of education and wellness programs for the community. She has educated many organizations on the importance of "whole person" wellness and is committed to helping facilitate a higher quality of life for the person with dementia.

Her objectives for her talk were to better understand Dementia (Alzheimer's disease), to learn the principles and practical techniques in communication, and to learn the principles and practical techniques in understanding and addressing challenging behaviors. She gave us information to help us to discriminate between dementia and Alzheimer's disease, and explained and that dementia is NOT a part of the normal aging process. Kari imparted so much valuable information that I have selected only an excerpt of her presentation dealing with principles for communicating with the dementia patient. (see below)



An update on one of our own Serrans Seminarian - Mike Rizzo

Thanks so much for thinking of me!! I would be happy to provide an update.

The semester has been going very well. There are now 13 seminarians here from the Diocese of Orange and we are the second largest group at Mt. Angel. Only Portland has more seminarians here than we do. Last week, we were hugely blessed to join our brothers from St. John's and St. Patrick's to travel to both Philadelphia and Washington DC to attend several Papal events as well as the World Meeting of Families. It was truly a once in a lifetime experience. We did not actually meet the Pope, but being in his presence was thrilling. One of the most exciting events that we attended was the Canonization Mass for Junipero Serra. I was thinking about all of you as the Pope pronounced the words that made Fr. Serra a saint.

Seminary life is both busy and enjoyable. There are eight other men here who are over 40, so I do not feel totally out of place among all of the young seminarians. The bells ring at 5:20 to get the day started. First year Theology studies include 6 classes as well as a field placement. My field assignment is at a prison for young men aged 18-25. I visit there once each week to speak with the men about our Catholic faith as well as other related topics that they want to discuss. Once each month, a priest joins us to celebrate Mass for the men. I feel very blessed to have this opportunity to respond to God's calling and hope that God continues to desire my ordination. Please give my best to all of my friends at the Serra Club. I look forward to seeing you when I am in the Diocese this Summer.
