REJOICE! Blessed Junipero Serra to be Canonized September 23, 2015

From the time he joined the Serra Club of Omaha in 1989, Tim O'Neill took the advice of his father, Maurice O'Neill, who told him that he must contribute and be active in any organization he might choose to join. His father was one of the charter members and President of the Serra Club of Council Bluffs; his dedicated example and wise counsel remains with Tim to this day as he aspires to accomplish his goals for Serra International.

After serving on the Serra Club of Omaha board, Tim was nominated as president for the 1996-97 year. But he did not stop there when his successful term was completed. He went on to become an active member with the USA Council of Serra International.

One of his most remarkable achievements took place in 2009 when he and his wife, Dr. Sally O'Neill, served as chairs for the Serra International convention held at what is now Century Link in Omaha. More than 500 Serrans from around the world joined us for three days and evenings

of unforgettable and delightful sessions uniting all of us working to foster and affirm vocations to the priesthood and consecrated life. Tim and Sally also hosted the 2014 Serra International Convention in Sacramento, California.

Tim was inducted as President during the Serra International Convention in Melbourne, Australia, July 30 to August 2, 2015.

On September 23rd, when Pope Francis arrives in Washington, D.C., to canonize our patron, Blessed Junipero Serra, Tim plans to be there for this blessed and historic event—to witness the first canonization in the United States.

Tim said, "I hope to be able to make a presentation to Our Holy Father—a gift from Serrans throughout the world. If that is not possible due to the crowds and restrictions of that ceremony, I shall take the gift to Rome in November where members of the Serra International board will be present for a special Mass for our group that will be followed by a gathering with Pope Francis."

The "gift" is an enameled lapel pin replicating a 44-cent airmail stamp with the picture of Junipero Serra and the map of California where Serra founded nine missions. An illustration of a mission church is also part of the image.



LOCAL - NATIONAL - AND INTERNATIONAL ACCLAIM FOR BLESSED JUNIPERO SERRA

By order of the United States Government, the U.S. Postal Service honored Junipero Serra in August 1985, by issuing a commemorative U.S. Airmail postage stamp. It features a portrait of the missionary priest along with an outline of the coast of California and Baja California where Serra had been in charge of several missions. Before his death, Serra had founded nine missions and also created a system in which 12 more missions were later founded.

The San Diego Convention and Performing Arts Center was the site of the opening ceremony where U.S. Postmaster General Paul Carlin unveiled the stamp to kick off the 99th Annual Convention of the American Philatelic Society. This introduction of an airmail stamp honoring the 18th – Century priest, Spanish missionary Junipero Serra, seemed to create a historic event in the minds and hearts of those present.

The next day, another ceremony took place at the San Fernando Mission where hundreds of people gathered to buy the treasured "first-day-issue" canceled stamps. Expectations were high that Pope John Paul II would declare Junipero Serra a saint. And now, 30 years later, their hopes and dreams will come true.

Pope Francis said that his September trip to the United States will include Philadelphia, New York and Washington, D.C. In1931 a bronze statue of Junipero Serra by sculptor Ettore Cadorin was installed in Statuary Hall in the United States Capitol, Washington, D.C., representing the State of California. Serrans were thrilled to learn that the Pope plans to canonize Blessed Junipero Serra at the Basilica of the National Shrine of the Immaculate Conception while he is in Washington, D.C.

President-elect of Serra International, Tim O'Neill, said, "This is a once-in-a-lifetime occasion for Serrans throughout the entire world but especially for those of us in the United States. We will do our best to obtain admission tickets for our Serrans to attend this canonization ceremony of our patron, Blessed Junipero Serra."

Tim reflected on how Serra was chosen to be our patron: "At one of Serra's earliest meetings in Seattle in March 1935, John Bray, a native of San Francisco, was a guest who said that Serra was recognized as 'the apostle of California' because he brought the Catholic Faith to the American West through a chain of missions he had established throughout what is known today as the state of California. In large measure, Serra was responsible for the foundation and spread of the Church on the West Coast when it was still mission territory. When John Bray proposed the club be named Serra Club after Father Junipero Serra, the group unanimously accepted his idea."

Now, 80 years later, Serrans in the United States will feel especially blessed when Pope Francis canonizes our patron. And Serrans throughout the world will rejoice that our patron will be honored with the title of sainthood. The recognition of Serra by the United States, Spain and other countries in past years has had a limited effect. This ultimate honor of sainthood will affect the entire world and especially those of us who cherish the distinction of being Serrans. We look forward to invoking his intercession with these words: "Saint Junipero Serra, pray for us."


A Reflection from our Chaplain Msgr. William Whelan

George Weigel Is one of the finest Catholic writers in our Church. He is often featured in *The Catholic Voice*. When I read his column a few Fridays ago, in reference to the Supreme Court's ruling regarding marriage, I thought this was one of the most helpful responses to the Supreme Court ruling that gay people have a right to marriage. This civil ruling will not affect the Church's teaching and practice regarding Catholic marriages, but it will put us in the position of living out our faith with new resilience and courage.

Let me quote directly from George Weigel's article: "The new normal (as the courts decision is called) will not leave the Catholic Church alone. As with everyone else who counters the new normal's ideology of anything goes, the Church will be aggressively attacked for daring to oppose that ideology. So it must learn - and learn fast - how to play a good defense, defending the right of our people and our institutions to be ourselves; it will do a service to America in the process." He goes on to say, "the living out of our convictions will bring about the re-conversion of the United States to right reason and moral truth and a Biblical way of seeing the world."

Here is George Wiegel's recommendation to us (his fellow Catholics) and it is wise: "From the Catholic point of view, the possible response to the new normal is a robustly evangelical Catholicism: one that displays true happiness in lives of solidarity with our fellow Catholics; one that links that happiness and solidarity to friendship with Jesus Christ, and the truths his Church teaches, inviting others to consider a still more excellent way. This calls for strong preaching, that calls Catholics

April 15 to May 28, 2015: A 500 Mile Pilgrimage Along the Camino de Santiago - the Way of St. James ... By Art Hastings

I surprised my family (and myself) last fall when I announced that I was going to travel to Spain and walk the 500 mile pilgrimage of Camino de Santiago to the tomb of St. James the Apostle. I am not a hiker or a backpacker. I do not speak Spanish. But I saw the movie "The Way" and it was my inspiration to undertake this adventure.

I had 9 months to prepare and immediately began reading everything available about the Camino de Santiago. St. James the Apostle was the first apostle to be martyred in 44. His body was buried in Spain. Pilgrimages to his tomb began in the 11th century but then stopped due to the Black Death and political turmoil in Europe. Very few pilgrims made this journey until 1987 when the Camino de Santiago was declared a European Cultural Route. It has become popular with 240,000 pilgrims completing at least portions of the walk in 2014.

I got practical advice about footwear, backpacks, trekking poles and a other hiking supplies from friends who are hikers. There is also a Facebook page for Americans on the Camino and many videos on YouTube.

The first task was to purchase hiking boots which I began to wear frequently in hopes I would not suffer foot problems in Spain. And I remained hopeful that my hip replacement of 13 years earlier would not be a problem, By March I was unable to put off the actual "hiking" any longer; panic was starting to set in about the fear of not being prepared. I began doing the 8 mile trail around Lake Zorinsky. I remember my first hike: it started to sprinkle, then rain, then a downpour, and then snow. The north wind was whipping across my face as I was going north on the high east rim of the lake. (In hindsight, the weather that day was worse than any I experienced in Spain!) Just being able to complete those 8 miles gave me confidence that I really could do this "walk." But just one thing – walking around Lake Zorinsky does not prepare you for the mountains in Spain.

On April 15, I flew to Madrid, and after 2 nights there to get on the same sleep cycle, I took the train to Pamplona. The Camino Frances, which is the most popular of many routes to Santiago, begins on the French side of the Pyrenees. I decided to skip those mountains and begin in Spain itself. Besides, I do not speak French! I had managed to learn minimal Spanish online and was able to "hablo espanol" enough to understand the basics.

Along the camino are hostels or "albergues" where a pilgrim can stay for one night. Each pilgrim must have proof that they are making the camino and must show their pilgrim book and their passport to be admitted. For the cost of 5 to 10 euros, the pilgrim is entitled to a mattress and access to shower and bathroom facilities. Some albergues also have washing machines. The pilgrim has one set of clothes on

his back and one set in the backpack. The pilgrim does not have to bring cooking supplies or camping equipment. Ideally, the backpack should be no heavier than 10% of your body weight.

In my first albergue, there were 114 beds! Along the way, most albergues had 15 to 30 beds. Fellow pilgrims were from all over the world – 140 countries in 2014. Pilgrims are of all ages with some much older than me! Communicating with fellow pilgrims is interesting as we try to overcome the language barriers. Any privacy in the albergues is non existent! There is no "schedule" or fixed number of kilometers a pilgrim must cover in a day. In the albergue, the rules are that lights go off at 10:00 PM and back on at

6:30 AM and everyone must be out by 8:00 AM. One night per albergue.

I was usually one of the last pilgrims to leave each morning. Some had already gotten up when it was still dark out and annoyed those of us trying to sleep as they made all the noises packing up their backpacks and using their flashlights. After eating some fruit I had purchased the night before or else finding a place open to buy a typical breakfast of coffee and a roll or Spanish omelette, I headed out on the Camino.

The path is clearly marked with yellow arrows or scallop shells painted on the streets, the walls, the houses, the barns, rocks, trees and even in the sidewalks of the larger cities.

As you walk along the way, you realize that each pilgrim has his/her own camino. There is no set pace. Some go slow. Some move quickly. Each pilgrim calls out "buen camino" as they pass other pilgrims, wishing each other well on their journey. There is a freedom in opening up oneself to complete strangers on the journey and you realize that as much as we come from different countries, we are all similar. And there is trust in God as each day brings new sights and challenges.

First Friday Mass - Another committee I was asked to help with was the First Friday Mass. The idea was to have a group of Serrans and spouses attend a First Friday Mass at a different parish in the metro area each month. Ed Sobetski was the chair and liked to see the gathering handled a certain way. First we had to "recruit" a parish. This involved taking the pastor to lunch and scheduling a First Friday Mass at his parish. Next we had a poster on the easel that was to be placed in the vestibule of the church announcing the upcoming First Friday Mass at which Serrans would be praying for vocations at the parish. After the Mass we would gather at a nearby restaurant for dinner. The Archbishop would be a frequent celebrant and attended the dinner as well. We would often schedule a year in advance. We all looked forward to not only the spiritually but social part of the evening. The beauty of this was we were able to visit churches we probably would never have had the pleasure of seeing.


Mass for Shut-Ins – It may have been in April or Mary of 1990 when Ed Hotz had to cut back on activities because of illness. He was one of the original committee members for the Mass for Shut-Ins. As far as we know our particular television Mass is the longest continuous running Mass dating back to February 1964. It was indeed an honor to take his place. The Mass is taped on Tuesday for the following Sunday at Channel 6 studios. Again this was particularly meaningful to me because my wife and I were in a high school together and it was normal to have local talent perform at the studios. Our high school presented a variety show of which we participated.

A few highlights of this activity for me start with my first Mass. Fr. Dave Reason was the Chaplin for our club and happened to be the celebrant that night. In those days, Fr. Dave was always light hearted and included funny stories in his homilies. We are taping and he is at the homily. He started to tell this story and got into the end and forgot the punch line. We were waiting and waiting and finally he said something like, "I think I forgot the punch line." I thought they would cut and re-tape, but production kept on taping so that Mass went out Sunday with Fr. Reason trying to remember the ending to his story. It was amazing, but it seemed like no one noticed.

Another taping was exciting for me. The staff and committee are very organized and run a tight production. We receive letters or emails well in advance as to what to expect or if there are any changes. We were never sure what happened but our team of **Herm Weist, Bill Ramsey** had fun together for twenty years.

On this particular night, Bill and Herm and the priest did not show. The actual taping started at 7:30 p.m. and we were asked to be there at 6:45.

At 7:00 p.m. calls were going out for a priest and **Fr. Vitalis** was able to come to the station. So, I got to do both old and new testament



readings as well as commentate. Because the cameras are close, my role was easy, but we had some conversation as to why I was the only one to be at the station that night.

I have a cousin who, when seeing me in person, would go on about my appearance on T.V. and how he watched me every Sunday. I told him I am on only in May, but that never seemed to change his enthusiasm or the fact that he saw me every week. (Go figure?)

A Personal Note – Our youngest son, Ben, teaches at Khalifa University in Abu Dhabi, The United Arab Emirates, so his visits are usually short and infrequent. He happened to be in town while we were scheduled for the Mass taping so he joined me for one of the sessions. Afterwards, I asked Archbishop Elden Curtiss if he would give us his blessing. I remember the feeling I had kneeling surrounded by the lights and cameras as the crew was taking down the set. The Archbishop blessed us. This was a time that was, as they say, "priceless!"

Final Thoughts - I wanted to mention many of the people who worked with me on Serra committees and how I hoped to be more like them. The Serra program allows us to use prayer and prayerful practices to supplement our physical activities. It also gives us a chance to meet or become acquainted with the likes of Ed Laughlin, past president, who took a personal interest in my membership in Serra and guided me when I really needed help; Don Keough (charter member); Walt Jahn who was always poster material for dedication and service; Dr. Robert Fitzgibbons (charter member) whose child performed surgery on my child to save his life. I do not believe these are coincidences.
